## TRI-MORAINE RECEIVES AUDUBON ADVENTURES RECOGNITION

On May 21 TMAS received a letter of recognition from Elaine O'Sullivan & Bonnie Godfrey, National Audubon Society's Audubon Adventures Office, for the chapter's participation in the Audubon Adventures program for grades 3-6. Twenty six chapters (out of over 480 chapters) representing 21 states were recognized for "their extraordinary efforts in reaching out to 50 or more classrooms" for the 2008-2009 school year. School districts and participating classrooms in the chapter's service area were listed in the January/ February issue of this newsletter. The top chapter on the list ordered 140 AA classroom kits while the chapter listed last ordered 51. TMAS is no. 16 while Black River Audubon Society, another Ohio chapter, is no. 18.

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#### CAN YOU HELP? HARDIN COUNTY VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

With the cost of gas escalating again, it's nice to find volunteer opportunities right in your own backyard. The chapter's February meeting featured Barb Snyder from Mount Victory. An Ohio Certified Volunteer Naturalist program graduate, Barb shared her enthusiasm for the program. Barb has adopted the Silver Creek Center for Environmental Studies in Hardin County as an ongoing community project. The Center is located on SR 67 W about two miles from Kenton. It's on the north side of the road and if you look sharp you'll spot the wooden sign in front. The twenty-five acre Center was donated to the Hardin Soil & Water Conservation District in 1986. In 1993 TMAS donated \$300 for the materials to construct an observation blind. The chapter held two summer picnics there over the years, now the Center is in need of some TLC. Invasive species need to be tackled, cleanup from vandalism and the littering of trash needs to be done, trees/wildflowers/resident birds need to be identified, and the list goes on. ## **BIG BIRDING DAY**

On May 11, TMAS's Big Birding Day, eleven birders (Ruth, Tom, Frank, Fern, Evelyn, Mary, Rachel, Ivan, Don, Jackie, and Eric) set out bright and early for a day of fun, food, and great birding. We visited Seven Birding hot spots on the western Lake Erie shore and by dinner time members of the group had collectively seen and identified 106 different species of birds (#106 was a male ring-necked pheasant waiting for us on the side of the road as we left our final stop for the day). Highlights include a black-crowned night heron, osprey, Wilson's phalarope, common moorhen, screech owls and great horned owlets, sora, least bittern, bald eagle, and twenty-eight species of warblers. Set aside the date, May 10, 2010, so you can join in the fun and birding with us next year.

## 2009 ENVIRONMENTAL WEEKEND REPORT

This year's EEW was held May 1-3. Don Rosenbeck reports that there were 51 participants (33 adults and 18 children). The program format was the same as past years with 3 blocks of programs on Saturday and 1 block on Sunday with four programs offered during each time block. Activities included bird walks, wildflower walks, pond ecology, owl calling, reptiles and amphibians, etc. Barred owls were seen Friday evening and woodcocks Saturday evening. 57 bird species were tallied. New this year was the addition of supervised activities for kids (e.g., carving turtles from soap and cane pole fishing) during the times between program offerings. This helped discourage kids from going off on their own between programs and received good feedback on the evaluation forms. The new camp policies implemented this year seemed fairly well received and did curb problems experienced in previous years.

## 2009 MIDWEST BIRDING SYMPOSIUM

Mark your calendar! On September 17-20 the Midwest Birding Symposium (MBS) is returning to Lakeside, Ohio,for the first time in a decade. Organizers of this premier birding event expect a capacity crowd of as many as 1,000 bird watchers from around the continent to converge along the shores of Lake Erie. The symposium will feature field trips to the area's best birding spots, programs and performances by North America's leading bird watchers, a vendor area with nature products and services, and an opportunity for birders to network with hundreds of their fellow enthusiasts. Tony Award winner Jane Alexander, NPR commentator Julie Zickefoose, Pulitzer Prize finalist Scott Weidensaul, and Roger Tory Peterson Award winner Kenn Kaufman are among the many speakers confirmed for the symposium. This is a beautiful park and the bridge was appreciated on such a wet day. It was warm and there was no wind so the 50 attendees and exhibits kept nice and dry. The chapter thanks Rev. Charles Richtmyer for his invocation, Auglaize County Commissioner Doug Spencer for his kind words, the volunteers who planned the dedicaion, and those who helped on dedication day. Thanks also to the exhibitors: Heritage Trails Park District of Auglaize Co., Miami and Erie Canal Corridor Association, West Central Ohio Land Conservancy, Grand Lake St, Marys/Wabash Watershed Alliance, and Eagles of the Grand Lake St. Marys Area. An introduction of selected attendees was followed by brief remarks about the IBA made by your chapter president and remarks by Gary Steinbrunner, conservation outreach specialist for Audubon Ohio's St. Marys River Basin Conservation Initiative. TMAS and the Initiative also had exhibits. An unveiling of the global and chapter signs for the IBA concluded the dedication ceremony followed by refreshments......TMAS has received word that its proposal for global warming educational materials has been accepted for a 2009 Audubon Ohio mini-grant.
