WHAT YOU CAN DO TO HELP CONSERVATION IN OHIO. No tax money is used to conserve, restore or manage wildlife and wildlife habitat in Ohio. Hunting and fishing license fees, the tax check-off, and the purchase of wildlife license plates all help fund Ohio Division of Wildlife's programs. And now there's the new Ohio Wildlife Legacy Stamp. If you're reading this newsletter, then you're probably a conservation believer. Purchasing this stamp will help fund habitat restoration, purchase land, preserve endangered and threatened species, fund wildlife and habitat research projects, provide educational products for students and wildlife enthusiasts, etc. The stamp sells for \$15. OHIO BREEDING BIRD ATLAS II (OBBAII). Are you aware you can help collect data for bird conservation efforts across the state? NO MATTER WHAT YOUR EXPERIENCE LEVEL MAY BE, one way you can help is to become a data collection volunteer for the Ohio Breeding Bird Atlas II. It has been almost 25 years since the completion of Ohio's first breeding bird atlas. Like the first atlas, OBBAII allows you to contribute information necessary for the effective conservation of Ohio's birds. The survey will document current distribution and conservation of breeding birds in Ohio, examine changes in distribution of breeding birds in Ohio over the last 25 years, provide statewide measures of bird abundance, identify important areas that support high bird diversity and species of concern, engage bird enthusiasts of all experience levels, and heighten public awareness of birds in Ohio. You can register by mail, phone, or online. Sign up for specific blocks, and record birds in the field during 2010 and 2011. Were you aware you do not have to take an entire block, but that you can submit information from your backyard, local parks, or some habitat that you frequent?
